




#### Immigrant health care access overview

Undocumented immigrants (and certain immigrant subgroups) are not eligible for Medicaid

High levels of uninsurance and low levels of contact with the health care system

California expanded Medi-Cal eligibility for undocumented residents in phases

- Supported by state funds
- Collectively enrolled close to 1,000,000 people in Medi-Cal



What impact does Medi-Cal expansion have on undocumented immigrants' health and utilization?

#### Immigrant health care access overview

Counties are "providers of last resort" for uninsured residents

 Prior to Medi-Cal expansion, many counties included undocumented immigrants in their local indigent care programs

**MyHealth LA (MHLA)** – Los Angeles County program for low-income uninsured residents who did not qualify for Medi-Cal


- Ran from 2014-2024, covered ~130,000 annually
- Patients enrolled in a primary care home in FQHCs and used county facilities for specialty, inpatient, and emergency care



MHLA can provide insight into the impact of Medi-Cal expansion by understanding how having regular access to care affects health care utilization and outcomes

#### **Avoidable ED Visits**

MHLA patients had fewer avoidable ED visits than documented patients and undocumented patients not in MHLA



#### **Avoidable ED Visits**


MHLA patients had more avoidable ED visits for short-term T2D complications

Fewer avoidable ED visits for long-term T2D complications




#### <u>Differences by MHLA</u> <u>enrollment</u>

Patients consistently enrolled in MHLA have the lowest levels of avoidable ED visits related to T2D complications



# Hospital admissions from ED visits

Among older patients, fewer hospital admissions among MHLA patients than documented patients



### **Summary**

If we use MHLA as a case study, undocumented patients who have a medical care home have better utilization outcomes (lower ED utilization) and seem to be managing chronic conditions well.

- Older patients in MHLA are less likely to be admitted to the hospital after an ED visit.
- Patients enrolled in MHLA have fewer avoidable ED visits for most conditions.
- Among MHLA patients, those who are consistently enrolled in the program have the fewest avoidable ED visits related to T2D.
